

Galbreath Preserve

8 April, 2011

Arrived 10:30, 20°C / 68°F
Sunny & clear w/ light breeze

Visited Galbreath ~~with~~ on a field trip with Vert Bio. We stopped at several locations in the preserve, looking for specific target species at each location. It is a beautiful preserve, and I'm very glad to have been able to visit it, finally.

At Emily's Research station, we viewed animals she collected:

Foothill yellow-legged frog
(*Rana boylei*)

Taricha granulosa
Taricha rivularis

We made a stop at the Restroom, and took a few minutes to look around.

Black Phoebe (*Sayornis nigricans*)

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Galbreath Preserve 6

Wood Duck Pond - we stopped to look at vents at this location. This is apparently the largest body of water on the preserve, and has water year-round. At this site we saw signs of rooting by wild pigs.

Pseudacris regilla - several specimens, in a variety of colors
T. granulosa, caught in traps
Dragonfly spp - larvae & nymph stages

Sheep Barn - there is a structure at this site; we spent most of our time turning over pieces of wood and small rocks, or looking around the rocky area.

Steller's Jay (Cyanocitta stelleri)
Aneides flavipunctatus - found 2 of these salamanders at this site - one under a piece of fallen tree (I found this one), and another under a plank of wood near the barn. Decided these were Black (not Arboreal) based on the relative size of the head to the body.

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Galbreath Preserve⁷

Batrachoseps attenuatus - found on hill, under a rock.

Pseudacris regilla - green color.

Sceloporus occidentalis 5-6 cm

From the hilltop where we stopped for lunch, we saw a couple of species (and heard several in the woods below, but I wasn't able to ID)

2nd Barn area - we stopped here briefly - mostly explored a large wood pile, but a few specimens were found elsewhere.

Waterfall - this is a beautiful spot, with a shallow creek, and small waterfall (~12 ft) flowing into a pool. (Reversing the vehicles back out of the area was also an adventure, as there was no place to turn around).


Taricha rivularis - these newts are abundant here in the stream and small pools near the waterfall. We saw dozens of individuals, and they were easy to catch and examine in hand.

T. granulosa - we found a small number (1-3) of these newts here.

Restroom stop - Before leaving Galbreath, we had a look around this area again, and I found uroctonus mordax - (probable)

I want to do a bit more research on the ~~idea~~ ID, but it seems this is likely the scorpion spp. I found under a rock. Dark-colored, ~3cm

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


